

FROM THE CEO

DID YOU KNOW that Trip Advisor users list Bonnet House the third most popular place to visit in Fort Lauderdale behind the likes of Fort Lauderdale Beach and Las Olas Boulevard? As a town known for fun in the sun and perhaps once again for Spring Break, that's a remarkable achievement! We

are stewards of a remarkable history and property, and the hospitality and stories provided by our volunteers and staff clearly resonate with area visitors.

However, in speaking with friends and neighbors who live here in Fort Lauderdale, how many times have you mentioned Bonnet House, and heard in response, "I've always meant to go there" or "oh yes, it's beautiful! I was there for a wedding twenty years ago and just never made it back." I hear things like this routinely, in fact far too routinely, and there is a plan to change that.

In January, Bonnet House will debut its first ever outdoor sculpture exhibition. Entitled Forest Forms and created by artist Huelani Mei, the exhibit will feature whimsical, large-scale metal sculptures of animals and plants that visitors will encounter

throughout the grounds. The exhibit is currently at Fernbank museum and gardens in Atlanta where it has opened to great fanfare. Its showing at Bonnet House from January 11th to April 27th next year will be its South Florida premier. Our hope is that Forest Forms will be the first in a series of sculpture



exhibits that utilize our unique greenspace to draw more repeat visitors to Bonnet House and raise the profile of the museum among locals. Keep an eye out for more information as the opening date approaches. Our fall newsletter is the edition where we share some financial information and even more importantly where we recognize donors who have done so much for Bonnet House. For space reasons, we can't list all of the hundreds of gifts and memberships that Bonnet House received in 2023-2024, but every gift is meaningful and counts. Bonnet House could not exist without such generous support, and we are particularly grateful for the donors listed in this newsletter. When Mrs. Bartlett preserved Bonnet House in 1983, her gift was the largest charitable contribution to that date in Florida history. Thank you so very much for helping to sustain the legacy left our community by the Birch and Bartlett families.

In the following pages, you will also find an unaudited synopsis of our financial status as of June 30, 2024 (our annual independent audit will be completed and available in October). A lot was accomplished last fiscal year, but we faced some challenges too, and I'd like to highlight some of this. First, I want to reiterate my thanks to all our donors. Bonnet House recorded a remarkable \$1.3 million in combined contributions, grants and memberships. While some of these are multi-year commitments which by accounting standards we recognize in their entirety the year the commitment is received, it's a remarkable show of support. At nearly \$725,000, tours were strong but down a bit compared to last year with a slightly softer winter season. In speaking with others in the hospitality industry, this is likely tied to a softening in tourism as post-COVID, people have travel options outside of Florida. Weddings and events (estate rentals) remain at a strong \$412,000. A lot of juggling happens on the weekends in season to accommodate museum visitors as well as private rentals, and our staff and volunteers deserve recognition for all they do to balance presenting our core programming with the rentals that directly support our operations.

On the expense side, our largest expense is staffing. We currently have 39 staff members, all essential to meeting our mission. It probably won't come as a surprise that insurance rates in Florida have sky-rocketed. Bonnet House reverted to Citizens for windstorm coverage last year with a premium of over \$80,000. On a more positive but still costly note was the \$331,500 spent on collection

conservation representing the restoration of the second floor exhibit rooms and the restoration of the grounds and slough and \$127,000 spent on more routine repairs and maintenance. We have made a lot of progress on deferred maintenance of which I am most proud.

On a final note, I would be remiss if I did not mention the veto of Florida arts and culture funding for the year that began July 1, 2024. Bonnet House had submitted a grant application that was competitively reviewed and scored by an independent panel of museum professionals and was expecting about \$80,000 in funding from the Florida Division of Cultural Affairs. The

blanket veto of arts grants was unprecedented, and \$80,000 is a significant amount for Bonnet House since the museum doesn't have a lot of discretionary spending that can be cut. As 2024 draws to a close, I ask you consider increasing your support for Bonnet House to help close the gap. You'll have the satisfaction of knowing that you stepped up in a time of unprecedented and unexpected need. Gifts from IRAs or gifts of significantly appreciated stock are all vehicles to thoughtfully consider.

THE CURATORIAL EYE

THIS PAST JULY, A TEAM OF VOLUNTEERS AND STAFF and I took on the vital task of beginning a full inventory of all items in the collection. Conducting an inventory of collections is crucial for museums as it brings to light what we have, where we have it, what condition it is in, and arguably the most important—why we have it. Partial inventories should be done in regular intervals with a full inventory about every 5 years. As we are accredited by the American Alliance of Museums, performing regular inventories also demonstrates careful management and stewardship of the museum's property.

Our museum boasts approximately 13,000 items that span across multiple centuries and places of origin. Bonnet House was not only a winter home for 75 years, it became a museum while continuing to be a home for a time. And we know Evelyn and Frederic did love to collect! Here at Bonnet House we have an online collections management system that serves as a database for everything in the museum. Each item, whether that be a painting, sculpture, plate, photograph, bench, bed frame, shell, article of clothing, etc. has what is called an "accession number" and its own entry in the system where it has a history of detailed documentation. In museum collections, an accession number is a unique identifier assigned to an artifact or object when it is officially added to the museum's collection. This number is attached to the item in various ways, through acid-free tags or written on the object in an inconspicuous place using archival quality liquid labeling that can be removed without damage.

Bonnet House and many other museums around the world use trinomial nomenclature where each of the three parts indicates a piece of information. Ours features the year it was accessioned into the collection, under what collection it is catalogued in our system, and a specific chronological number of when it was accessioned that year. For example: 1990.FB.001, where FB indicates it is a Frederic Clay Bartlett original work of art. Over the years these numbers may fade, become illegible, or get lost, while other items may never have been accessioned for various reasons or were donated or brought in as educational props. This is what makes this inventory particularly challenging in an effort to account for each and every item. The team become sleuths and researchers, combing through physical and digital archives to amend each conflict. So far, we are doing very well. It is a meticulous and vast task to tackle the large collection, but is very achievable. In doing so, we are ensuring what is being displayed is authentic, educational, and meaningful, while being maintained to the best of our ability for generations to come.

The courtyard coordinator points out special areas and explains the tour QR codes. The room docents guide guests and point out interesting things along with telling the

history of the family. We have guides for guided tours five days a week, and the grounds volunteers keep the outside looking beautiful. The orchid volunteers nurture many plants that were actually once owned by Mrs. Bartlett, and there are the volunteers who teach our school students. Each person brings a special talent to Bonnet House, but the one talent that they all possess is their love of Bonnet House and their love of sharing everything they know about this special place. The enthusiasm of our volunteers knows no bounds!

Our education programs for the schools start in September. Our programs range from a special pre-school offering to programs for fifth graders so our volunteer and staff teachers will have a remarkably busy year. There might even be a possibility to see more middle and high school students this year. Our adult education programs resume in October after the summer heat and will go into May of next year. The teachers are wonderful and love sharing their knowledge with each student.
